



WORLD LEADER IN TRAINING GLOBAL HEALTH DIPLOMACY

Executive training in global health diplomacy has been successfully pioneered by the Graduate Institute's Global Health Centre (GHC) in Geneva. Launched in 2007, the centre has developed extensive experience in delivering executive education in global health diplomacy and governance, in Geneva and elsewhere, for health and international professionals from government ministries, international and non-governmental organisations, academia and the business sector at the global, regional and country level. To date, the GHC has provided capacity-building, comprising of face-to-face, online and blended learning, to more

than 1600 individuals – mostly senior-level professionals – from more than 100 countries. Since 2017, the Geneva-based executive courses allow participants to obtain a Certificate of Advanced Studies (CAS) in Global Health Diplomacy.

The GHC remains unique in being located within an academic institution of higher education in international relations. It combines outstanding expertise, experience and methodologies that allow the delivery of a comprehensive and relevant learning package.

PIONEERING GLOBAL HEALTH DIPLOMACY

The GHC is the leader in the field of global health diplomacy and has gained international recognition in this area: The centre was the first academic institution to run face-to-face executive courses in global health diplomacy, and has successfully done so since 2007. It has established itself as the entry point for global health diplomacy training worldwide, and has run executive training, high-level seminars and workshops in

China, Egypt, Hungary, Indonesia, Kenya, Moldova, the USA, Sudan, Switzerland, Turkey, Malta and Iran, among others. The GHC was also the first institution to develop and offer online courses on global health diplomacy in 2012. An example is the ten-week mandatory online course in global health diplomacy developed for heads of WHO offices in countries, territories and areas.

The GHC has developed extensive experience in tailoring its training offer to specific audiences and for ongoing thematic negotiations: Training activities are designed to meet the needs of specific audiences and to reflect the ongoing debates and discussions in global health diplomacy. Each training activity is characterised by its innovative approach and differs in its curriculum to ensure up-to-the-minute relevance. The centre is in a position to develop role-play and simulation exercises that best serve the needs of the target group. Standardised and tailor-made training materials are available for each course to support the learning objectives.
