### **Programme of Study**

**Total Number of Credits:** 120, broken down into 90 course credits and 30 credits for the MIS Thesis ("dissertation"); each 2h per week semester course is worth 6 credits. Students are permitted to take up to 12 additional credits in Political Science without permission. In case the desired credits are in another discipline, special permission is required.

#### Six Required Courses:

- 1. A sequence (one per semester in semesters 1-3) of the following courses on concepts and methodology:
  - o Theories and Theorists in International Relations (Autumn 2019, Prügl)
  - o Research Design (Spring 2020, Dupont)
  - o Statistics for International Relations Research I (Autumn 2019, TBC)
- 2. Three of the five *Study of International Politics* (SIP) courses:
  - o 1: oInternational Security (Autumn 2019, Krause)
  - o 2: oInternational Political Economy (Spring 2020, Rho)
  - o 3: oForeign Policy Analysis (Autumn 2019, Sylvan)
  - o 4: oInternational Governance (Autumn 2019, Hofmann)
  - o 5: oComparative Politics (Spring 2020, Kolbe)

Seven Electives in Political Science: choose from courses among a list of substantive or methodological topics.

#### Two Electives Outside of Political Science

Students must take two complementary courses outside of political science. For these complementary studies, they can choose among classes in any of the other three disciplines at the Institute. In addition, and depending on their topic of study, students may be authorized to take up to 2 additional elective courses outside of political science (in that case the number of electives to be taken in political science would be reduced accordingly).

#### **MIS Thesis**

Original research not to exceed 30,000 words.
