Elizabeth Glaser Pediatric Aids Foundation | EGPAF

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BACKGROUND AND MISSION

The Elizabeth Glaser Pediatric AIDS Foundation seeks to end global pediatric HIV/AIDS through prevention and treatment programs, research, and advocacy. Elizabeth Glaser started the Pediatric AIDS Foundation with Susie Zeegen and Susan DeLaurentis, after her daughter, Ariel, lost her battle with AIDS in 1988. The foundation had one critical mission: to bring hope to children with HIV and AIDS. Today, the Elizabeth Glaser Pediatric AIDS Foundation is the global leader in the fight to end AIDS in children. Since its inception in 1988, there has been a 95 percent decline in new pediatric HIV infections in the US. Globally, new pediatric infections have been reduced by more than half since the year 2000. The foundation aims to expand high quality, evidence-based, locally sustained HIV/AIDS programs and services, as well as strengthened health systems to end HIV/AIDS among children, adolescents, and families; to advance research and innovation to prevent, treat, and end HIV/AIDS; and to advocate for global, regional, national, and local policies and guidelines, resources, and political leadership to end HIV/AIDS among children, adolescents, and families.

HEALTH-RELATED ACTIVITIES

To achieve our vision for an AIDS-free generation, the Elizabeth Glaser Pediatric AIDS Foundation (EGPAF) implements high-quality and comprehensive HIV and AIDS prevention, care and treatment services throughout regions of the world most affected by the disease. We work hand-in-hand with country governments and local partners to implement health care programs which offer adult, adolescent, and pediatric HIV prevention, care and treatment; adult, adolescent, and child opportunistic infection treatment; maternal, newborn, and child care; nutrition and general wellness; and sexual and reproductive health services. EGPAF offers these services through both direct management of health facilities and health systems strengthening. GPAF is dedicated to improving all aspects of national, regional, and local health systems through improving service delivery, strengthening the health workforce, improving health information systems, increasing access to essential medicines, improving health financing, and building leadership and governance capacity.

GOVERNANCE AND STAFF

Since being named President and Chief Executive Officer in 2010 Charles Lyons has led the Foundation through significant changes to the programmatic and advocacy portfolio of work, including the organization's transition from several centrally managed, global awards to managing a broad range of bilateral awards in a dozen countries. Brad Kiley is responsible for overseeing and managing EGPAF's business operations functions. Trish Karlin is the Executive Vice President, External Affairs and Business Development, for EGPAF. Trish leads a global team that directs business planning, resource development, marketing and communications for EGPAF's international programs, which represented \$140 million in HIV service delivery, advocacy and research. The senior management is overseen by a board of 14 people, currently chaired by Russ Hagey.

FUNDING SOURCES AND BUDGET

Of EGPAF's total expenditures in 2017, more than 91 percent went to our lifesaving programs around the world, raising more than \$ 180.000.000 from private sectors and public institutions.
