Course Description

6 - 7 December 2019

This 3 ECTS workshop introduces students to the skills of evaluating development projects. More specifically, the workshop provides a practical step-by-step guide and presents the main tools and methodologies required to design and conduct an internal and/or external evaluation based on techniques. While the focus of the workshop will be on qualitative approaches, key elements of quantitative evaluations will also presented and discussed.

The course will also briefly introduce some key aspects of project management tools; the use of case studies will allow the students to immediately put into practice the knowledge acquired.

Syllabus

Course Requirements

Requirement 1: Active participation in all the sessions of the workshop is required. It is also essential that students come prepared: they are expected to consult the assigned readings and/or online resources to prepare for the course.

Requirement 2: Students will be required to complete a case study exercises in small groups throughout the workshop.

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Requirement 3: Students will also be requested to work in group and write a short evaluation report (3 pages maximum) of the case study. The note has to be submitted not later than one week after the end of the workshop.

Course Evaluation

Evaluation will be based on:

- (i) Attendance and participation in class discussions, and evidence of familiarity with the assigned readings (33%)
- (ii) Group oral presentations of the exercises of the case studies (33%)
- (iii) Group written evaluation analysis of the case study to be submitted not later than one week after the end of the workshop (33%)

The Patton publication is a main reference for qualitative methods inquiries and it is used in many evaluation trainings. The on-line portal of the SDC is a comprehensive project management portal, with a section dedicated to evaluation, with theoretical inputs, exercises and examples.

Finally, the UNDP evaluation handbook provides the methodologies used to assess and evaluate UNDP sponsored projects across the world.
